

From the Vocational Departments

CLOTHING: The Sophomore girls are studying color combinations and designing. They will soon complete their garments and will then start on their next project, which is to make dresses for the grade school girls.

The Junior class have completed their garments and are now busy making rain capes for the smaller girls. They are taking up an extensive study of textiles, and are also studying the principle of clothing selection. The girls are interested in their knitting and have done good work in that line.

ARTS AND CRAFTS: Mrs. Pepper's Freshmen girls are doing nice work in designing scarfs. They have made a "Personal Appearance Chart" which is in charge of a different girl each week. The girls of the class are individually inspected for their personal appearance daily. Each week, one girl has charge of the bulletin board.

The Sophomore girls are finishing their reports on Dress Selection, and will soon start on designs for scarfs. The class hopes to order buckskin and beads for doing beadwork. Verne Standing Bird displayed a fine exhibit of Indian Art and Beadwork this past week.

COMMERCIAL: The Commercial classes are doing very fine work, and the Senior class especially has taken much interest in both shorthand and typing. They have made noticeable improvement in reading and writing shorthand, and they have all improved in their typing. The advanced class is getting more practical experience by being able to work in the various offices.

FOODS: The Senior foods class have completed their problem of planning, preparing, and serving luncheons. They are now preparing various kinds of salad dressings.

The Sophomore girls, under the instruction of Miss White, prepared and served a dinner for all the new employees. The girls are now making a study of luncheons and are preparing salads.

The Eighth Grade class have finished a study of light breakfasts, and are now learning to prepare medium and heavy breakfasts.

Mrs. Johnson's Food class has started a study of beverages for breakfast, and are learning the proper ways of preparing cocoa, coffee, and tea.

HOME RELATIONS: The Senior Home Relations class have finished drawing the plans for the kitchen of the practice house, but have made no decision on the matter of selecting any certain drawing.

AUTO MECHANICS: The boys have been working quite rapidly since Stanley Wilder has been bringing a radio to the shop. The tool boy has just learned what a "sky hook" is.
