



The Fort Peck Homeroom students have been very active in their work. They are working on a map of their reservation, and are studying the information which they have from last year. Each member of the class records the information in a notebook and he studies from that. They have also been debating.

The members of the Umatilla Homeroom have started a map of the Umatilla reservation. They are studying the information which they had received last year.

The California Homeroom has been debating during the Homeroom period. They have also been making maps and finding out where most of the Hoopa Indians live.

The Yakima Homeroom has been studying information about their reservation, and have started plans for making Christmas presents.

The Blackfoot Homeroom has been copying information about their reservation concerning the size, population, and resources on their reservation. They have made their Christmas gifts.

The Tongue River Homeroom is very busy writing letters to the superintendent of their reservation for more information on land projects, health problems, and opportunities for jobs on the reservation. They have been studying the Indian Reorganization Act, which their reservation accepted, and will soon start a review on the Constitution and By-Laws of the Tongue River Reservation. They are getting additional information about allotments to put up on the map for the benefit of the new members.

The members of the Flathead Homeroom are preparing to give reports on the different projects concerning their reservation.

The Grand Ronde Homeroom class has been studying the map of the southwestern part of Oregon. They have written for information on Rehabilitation Loans, and will make a study of that when they receive the information.

The Colville No. 2 Homeroom has been writing letters for information from their agency, and have received information for maps which they are planning to make.

The Colville No. 1 Homeroom has several committees at work; the housing committee has been making reports on the conditions and sanitation in the homes on the reservation, and also about the recreation in the homes. The employment committee has been making reports on the employment problems on the reservation. The land committee has been making reports on irrigation, land, timber, mining, and the natural resources on the reservation.

The Fort Belknap Homeroom has received good encouragement from the agents on the reservation, and have also received new maps of the reservation. They have been studying the Constitution and By-Laws of their people and have had spelling matches with words taken from the Constitution.

SILETZ: This group is going to draw a new map of the reservation. An official of their reservation will furnish them with some information which will be valuable in the making of this map.

TULALIP No. 2: In response to the temporary chairman, Stanley Williams, this group is deciding on what information may be gathered on the reservation during the Christmas vacation. Prizes will be given by Mr. James for the best information brought in.

TULALIP No. 1: The group in this Home room has been putting various sources of information received from Superintendent Upchurch last year in notebooks. They have held two debates, and were victorious in both. They held two "spelling bees," losing one match and tying the other.

WARM SPRINGS: New maps have been started, especially to put in the new roads, cultivated, and irrigated lands. Essays are now being written on different projects of the reservation. With Rosco Smith as new president they are deciding which information each member is to secure during Christmas vacation.

NORTHERN IDAHO: Each member of this group is required to draw a map of the reservation to get the estimation of the size and location, and each one has to study its resources.

TAHOLAH: Essays have been written on alcohol and tobacco. During Christmas vacation members are to get information on labor on their reservation. They haven't received the information on education and housing so they are still writing to the agency.
