BEN FINLEY TELLS HOW HE SHOES A HORSE

1. Clean hoof and rasp level.
 2. Measure hoof for size of shoe.
 3. Heat shoe and turn down heel calks.
 4. Enlarge nail holes to fit nails.
 5. Level shoe and shape to fit hoof.
 6. Be sure shoe fits hoof and then nail on.
 7. Nails should be started just outside of quick, with the flat side of nail to outside.
 8. After nailing is done, clip nails off and rasp under each nail.
 9. Clinch each nail by holding weight under nail and pounding on head of each nail.
 10. Rasp and polish outside of hoof around shoe.
