Dr. Willard Beatty, Director of Indian Education, Visits Chemawa

Dr. Willard Beatty, Director of Education in the Indian Service, from Washington D. C., gave a talk to the students of Chemawa on September 10.

Dr. Beatty was introduced to the student body by Mr. Jackson. Dr. Beatty's speech was mostly based on the importance of Agriculture and other important subjects, as reservation study, and the improvement of the home. He pointed out different reasons why he thought that boys and girls should take an interest in their life at home. He stated that on many of the reservations he had visited, he found that many of the boys and girls were not going to school. These boys and girls would have a happier life if they only took a deeper thought of the future. The graduates of these different Indian Schools have found out that their education is worth their while to them.

In the Reservation Study of any reservation, students should find many improvements being made and more that are needed. On some reservations, there are great demands for agriculture, fishing, and many other jobs. Chemawa should teach these jobs in order for students to be qualified for them.

On Sept. 9, Dr. Beatty was honored with a dinner at Hawley hall where all the staff members were present.

On Sept. 10, a meeting was held in which Dr. Beatty related his experiences in Alaska and discussed the problems that faced the student body of Chemawa.

That is the first time Dr. Beatty has ever visited Chemawa during a school term. The Chemawa Indian School extends to Dr. Beatty an invitation to visit our school again.

Reuben Sanders, "A True Sportsman," Retires From Service

Reuben Sanders, one-time famous athlete of Chemawa and one of the teaching staff for thirty years, retired on July 14.

On that date, Chemawa students, employees,

and out of town friends were present at the dedication of Sanders Field, which was held in honor of his athletic ability. He played with the teams of Multnomah Club and Chemawa, Salem Capital Athletic Club and the Sherman Indians, when he became so well known in the Pacific Northwest regions.

Among those present at the dedication were Senator Charles L. Mc Nary, who was manager of the 1900 Salem football team of which Rube was a member. The Governor, Charles A. Sprague, and ex-teammates, made brief speeches during the picnic dinner which was served on the Chemawa campus.
