Descendant of Chief Little DeCorah Dies at Tacoma

Grant DeCorah, 53, former instructor in leather craft at Chemawa, and the reigning descendant of chief Little DeCorah, signer of the treaty ceding large tracts of Iowa, Illinois and Wisconsin to the United states, died Wednesday, April 8, at the Indian hospital in Tacoma.

Born in Wisconsin, DeCorah was one of the first teachers sent by the government to the school at Tulalip. He also was one of the first postmasters there.

An athlete in his younger days, DeCorah suffered an injury while pole vaulting from which he never fully recovered. Two of his brothers were accepted in for service with the nation's world war No. 1, both giving their lives for their country.

Coach Stuart Enlist in Air Corps

Coach Gene Stuart left Saturday, April 4, for his home in Ontario, Oregon, where he will visit with his parents until he is called to his post in the Army Air Corps.

Replacing Doug Olds, Gene Stuart came from the Willamette University and has been coaching here since the beginning of the second semester. He also taught Chemistry.
