Sacred Heart Upsets Chemawa 34-21

One of the biggest upsets of the year was played in the Sacred Heart gym on Jan. 27.

The Chemawa Indians invaded the Independence Maple Court Tuesday, Jan. 19, only to come back with a 48-41 setback.

In the final quarter Silverton overcame the three point margin which Chemawa held throughout the game. The final count was Silverton 29, Chemawa 26. Whitford scored 11 points, followed by his

teammate Williams with 9. For the visitors, Zahler made 14 points while Moon scored 5.

GRADE SCHOOL: On January 22, Miss Grissom took charge of the curriculum meeting of the teachers. It was a meeting that amused and held the interest of all. This was achieved by having some of her students put on a demonstration of how their classes are conducted. The children showed a great deal of ability in producing a radio program, singing songs, reading, and reciting nursery rhymes.

Miss Hazel Chambers' sixth grade class was inspired by the snow to make winter scenes. The snow men, trees, and other parts of the pictures were cut from paper of various colors. The results are very artistic and imaginative.

Under the guidance of their teacher, Miss Winona Sunrise, the third and fourth grades are studying our culture groups of the Indians in the United States—the coast, southwest, plains, and eastern woodland areas. They are studying how the Indians got their food and clothing and how they made shelter. They are learning to distinguish between the various groups, Arts and Crafts. The students are making booklets as well as maps illustrating the stories of each culture area.

Students of Miss Pauline Rector's fourth grade are learning about geography and government through a unit on rationing. They have asked employees to save magazines and newspapers so that they may cut out pictures representing coffee, sugar, rubber, and other rationing. They learn why these articles are being rationed and from where they come.
