Trackmen Lose to Molalla

The Molalla Buckeroos gave the Chemawans their first loss of the season. Bad weather accounted for the poor record on both sides.

Thus far, the Indians have placed first in a triangular meet and lost this one.

The Indians have plenty of outstanding talent this year, and the rest of the boys are showing improvement as the season progresses.

The Buckeroos chalked up 72 points to the Indians 50. The relay proved to be a disastrous affair for the Chemawans, Walters fell on a slippery bend, and Molalla went on to easily win that event.

Outstanding boys for Molalla were: Calhoun who took 1st in the mile and 880; Frick 1st in shot-put, discus and javelin. Chemawa's George Walters was high point man at the meet, taking 1st in the 100, 220, and broad-jump.
