An even 43 children participated in the moving epidemic as they transferred their possessions a few feet from their school-year home to Winona where living and recreational rooms suitable for little folk are being arranged. For many of the 74, "leaves" from the campus continue to be planned; for the few girls remaining a social and recreational program is beginning to function.
