Health films, "Goodbye Mr. Germ," a film on tuberculosis, and "Behind a Smile," on dental care, were shown on February 29 to all students. They were shown first in Brewer hall, then Winona and last McNary, by Dr. Stone and Mrs. Seawright.

Dr. Stone gave an interesting talk to the boys following the showing of the films. It is planned to do this once each month.
