PREVENTION IS STRESSED

Many of the new students are receiving diphtheria immunizations. This treatment consists of a Schick Test to determine whether or not the child is immune to the disease. If the test is positive, the student receives 3 to 5 injections one month apart. The number of doses depends upon the student's age. It is so easy to prevent this dreaded disease. Prevention is to be stressed in all communicable diseases.
