With fine Spring weather, baseball began early this year. A large group of aspirants were in the first call. Among them were three of last year's regulars, Ralph Charles, Vernon Lane and Robert Placid. We had three weeks in which to prepare for our first game. Unusually good weather allowed the fellows to get into shape in a hurry and the first of May found us on our way to Gervais for our first league encounter.

The first inning Don Rambeau, Vernon Lane and Robert Placid

found opponent's pitching to their liking and we scored 2 runs this inning. From there we went on to win by a score of 5-4. Reggie Wells, pitching his first complete ball game, was the master all the way through with the rest of the fellows showing mid-season form.

The touted Aumsville Rangers came to Chemawa for our next league encounter. Robert Placid and Reggie Wells pitched good ball, allowing only 2 hits between them but costly errors allowed the victors to score their runs and the Aumsville chucker was too much for our boys to fathom, so we came out on the short end of this score 4-1.

The J.V.'s from Salem High came to Chemawa for a practice game in which we used three pitchers but all their efforts were in vain as we were beaten soundly 10-1.

The next day St. Paul came to Chemawa for our third league encounter. The Indians got back in stride and with some very effective hitting from Vernon Lane and William Belgarde and with the fine pitching performance of Reggie Wells, we ended with a victory. Score being 7-4.

Now having two league victories and only one defeat, we traveled to Hubbard, engaging this school in our next league game. Timely hitting by Don Rambeau, who had a triple and a single, Robert Placid and Ralph Charles coming through with run-producing blows, we compiled 8 runs. Our mound chores were again handled by Reggie Wells, who let Hubbard down with 3 blows and only one run.

We then returned to Chemawa for our final league game of the season against the Jefferson Lions. George Plummer was the big gun in our hitting attack, getting two for three, while everyone else was getting at least one blow, to make our final total 14 runs. Reggie Wells in this game pitched the best game of the season, letting the visitors down with

one hit. The rest of the fellows performed in a masterly fashion, also, committing only one error. Only three men reached first base, thus Wells faced only 24 men in the ball game.

We then journeyed to Turner for the next to last ball game of the season, which many of the fellows would rather forget. Turner, finding latent power at bat, came through with a smashing 15-3 victory. All that can be said for this game is that we should have stayed home.

Sublimity was the competition for the last game of the season. This also rounded out our league schedule. In the first inning we came through with two quick runs, but that is as far as we got with the offerings of the Sublimity pitcher. Reggie Wells pitched hard all the way through but a few mental miscues, along with a few hits interspersed, accounted for 6 Sublimity runs which deficit we could not overcome. With this note baseball ended at Chemawa for the season of 1949.
