CHEMAWA BENEFITS FROM STUDY GRANT

Chemawa students will profit from the \$12,000 granted to the University of Oregon by the U. S. Health Service, for the study of tooth decay.

Six hundred students between the ages of 6 and 16 are a part of the project to discover the relationship between saliva and decay in the mouth. Monthly samplings of saliva are taken in this extensive study. Yearly clinical and X-Ray examinations will correlate the saliva study and dental health.

Special attention is being given

the Navajo students who come to the Northwest with a small percentage of tooth decay but develop it in their time here.

The survey is under the direction of Dr. Marshall Snyder, head of bacteriology, and Dr. Theodore Suher, head of dentistry for children, assisted by Dr. John Dickson and Dr. Keith Claycomb.
