KNOW YOUR HOLIDAYS

November

Thanksgiving Day originated when Governor Bradford of the little colony of Pilgrims sent four men out to shoot fowl so that the little colony might celebrate, in a special way, after the first gathering of the harvest. For many years, Thanksgiving was celebrated only occasionally. When the Civil War brought the people a new feeling of unity the day became recognized generally. Since 1863, the President of the United States has issued a Thanksgiving proclamation asking people to observe the last Thursday in November to give thanks for the blessings they received during the preceding year.

December

The Christian festival of Christmas is celebrated by every State, Territory, and possession of the United States in memory of the birth of Christ. This date was chosen in early times to draw the Christian people away from the heathen festivities celebrated by the Romans during that time of the year. It is said that the first Christmas was celebrated in the second century by order of Telesphorous, the seventh Bishop of Rome.

The name of the day comes from the fact that in the Roman churches a mass in honor of Christ's birthday, was celebrated on that day. In France, it is called Noel—in Italy, Natale, and in Germany, Weihnachten—all, the word for "birthday."
