AG STUDY SHOWS—

"Good Grades—Better Income"

A recent study, covering a period of fifteen years, was made of 300 vocational agriculture boys to see if there was any correlation between grades in agriculture and income. The teacher making the survey found this to be true: The better the grade—the more money he will be making ten years later. The students who made—

A in agriculture made an average income of \$3,878

B students were making \$2,835

C students were making \$2,120

D students were making \$1,700

F students were making an average of less than \$1100.

This study has been checked and double checked. "Agriculture today is highly competitive and it takes a smart boy to become a successful farmer."

Seventy-five per cent of all the D and F agriculture students that started farming are no longer living on the land.

As this is true of AG, it most likely is true in other fields. This survey shows us that there definitely is a relationship between school grades and a successful career. The results should serve instructors and advisors in guiding students toward a desire for bettering grades in view of the demands of competitive living.
