HEALTH CENTER

On April 11, Mrs. Junita Browning was called to Washington, D. C. to receive the Superior Service Award of the Department of Health, Education & Welfare. The award was personally presented by Secretary Anthony J. Celebreeze. It consist of a silver medal, a lapel pin, and a certificate. The award reads:

"Mrs. Juanita Browning, Director of Nurses, whose service to the Indian people has been marked by exceptional leadership, competence and devotion—has made a major contribution to the Indian Health Program and reflected credit on the U. S. Public Health Service."

Mrs. Browning came to Chemawa from Tohatchi, New Mexico, in August 1960.

The students and staff members of the Bureau of Indian Affairs say, "Congratulations Mrs. Browning."

One of the health problems is a hearing loss in a large number of students which is the result of ear infections when they were younger. Much has been done to help the hearing.

Forty-four boys received spotted fever (tick) shots before going on jobs in Eastern Oregon.
