Fifteen new staff members have come to Chemawa this fall, from many parts of the country. They replace other employees or take up duties in the expanded program. They are:

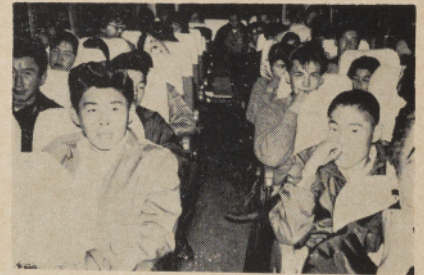

EMPLOYMENT EXPERIENCE GAINS

Each Saturday many students go to work. Some work in Home Service while others do other types of work as platoon work, yard work and farm work. An average of about 65 girls are in Home Service each Saturday. These girls have three types of cards. Beginners earn 40c per hour until they have completed a certain number of hours of successful work. They then are raised to a 50c per hour card and then to a 65c card. Girls use the money to pay for their Homemaking projects and other things they need.

Since August 31 there have been 483 jobs and through October 12 the girls had earned a total of \$2,078.83. Saturday Home Service is a privilege. Mrs. Hauser, supervisor of Home Service, makes some suggestions for the Home Service Worker:

1. Return your work card as you return from work.
2. Be sure to save money for your bus fare each week.
3. In cold weather wear a warm jacket or coat.
4. Dress properly for work.
5. Give your employer your best effort and follow her instructions.
6. Always be on time.
7. Be sure to have a substitute for your detail and pay her.
