RELIGIOUS PROGRAM STARTED

In order that students who do not attend religious services off-campus may be able to attend religious services, church and instruction classes are held each Sunday morning. On campus services are available for Catholic, Protestant and L.D.S. students. The Board of Home Missions sponsors a Protestant missionary while Mt. Angel Seminary and nearby parishes provide instruction for Catholic students. The local L.D.S. churches provide instruction and services for students of that faith.

Rev. Antonio Sciabassi O.F.M. and Rev. Vincent Fitzgerald, O.F.M. hear confessions and celebrate mass, while seminarians give instruction. Rev. William H. Stevens is the Protestant missionary. Rev. Stevens came to Chemawa this year from Sherman Institute, Riverside, California where he was religious leader. He replaces Miss Johnson and Miss Olds who retired in August.

Episcopal students attend church at St. Timothy's in north Salem, while Friends and Lutherans are transported to nearby churches.
