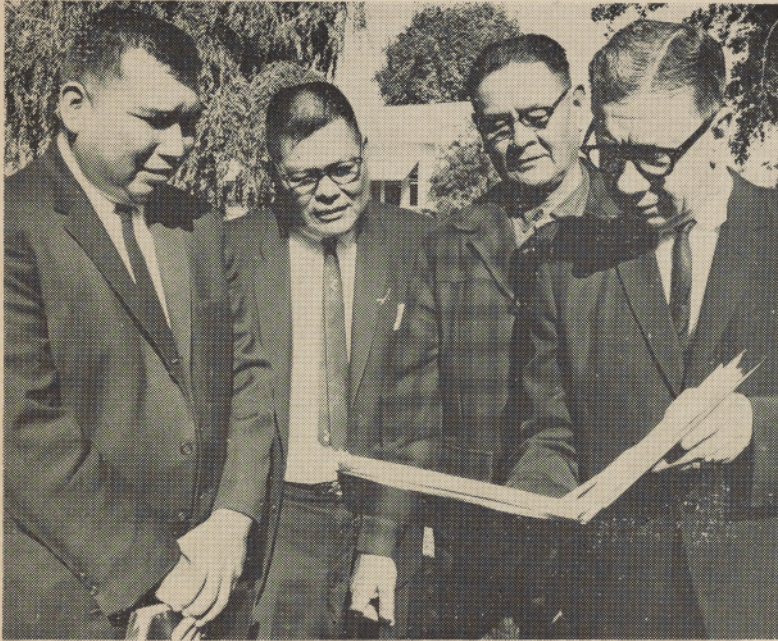


Tribal Council Pays Annual Visit



Four members of the Navajo Tribal Council's education committee visited Chemawa on Monday October 5. These members visited our school to visit with the Navajo students and to make a regular routine inspection of facilities and scholastic standards.

The four member committee consisting of Mr. Guy Gorman, Mr. Wilson Grey, Mr. Clifford Beck, and Mr. Earl Johnson, met in the auditorium with Navajo and Alaskan students where Mr. Gorman gave an inspiring speech on the importance of getting a sound educational foundation as the tool for advancement of their own standard of living. He stressed the fact that scholarships are becoming more and more difficult to obtain, as the number of applicants for them increases. He warned students that while the schools could provide the facilities and opportunities for learning the actual act of learning is an individual thing which is the reward of the person who shows energy, initiative, and desire.

Mr. Gorman told us that 1500 Navajo students will be graduating from high school this year while

twenty years ago only a few were graduating.

Mr. Walters told us that 15 years ago only 28 Navajo's were in college while today there are more than five hundred.

Mr. Grey, Mr. Beck, and Mr. Johnson also spoke to the students telling them to get the most they could from their education and to strive to improve their own position in life.

HOMECOMING CELEBRATION

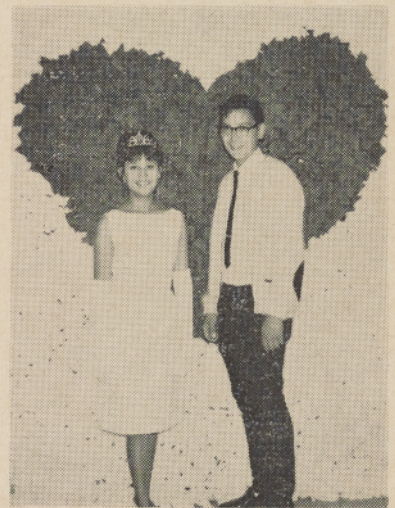
Friday, October 23, Chemawa's football homecoming was celebrated. A bonfire, parade, the football game and dance were the highlights for the event.
