HEARTS DANCE

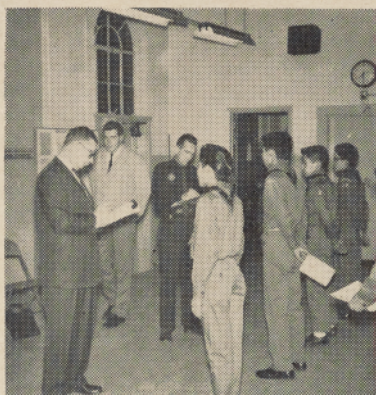
A highlight of the month of February was the Valentine Dance.

LOTS TO EAT

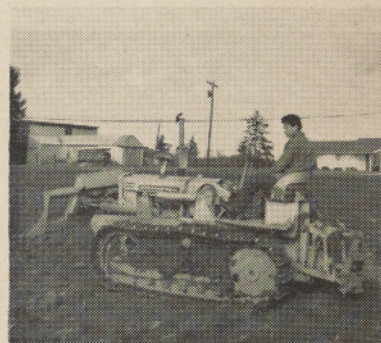
