WHY I AM AN EXPLORER SCOUT

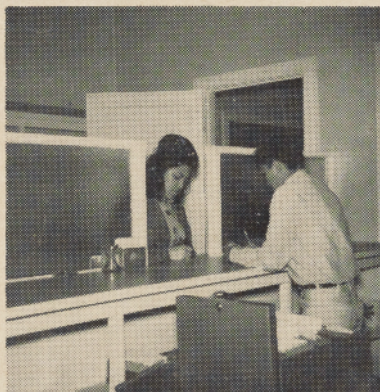
This is my second year in the Explorer Post 123 and I like it very much. In the scouts we do many things which are interesting and educational.

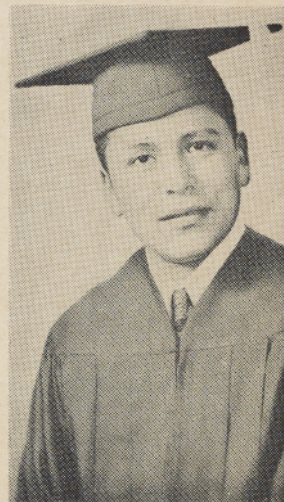
THE GREAT LAND
