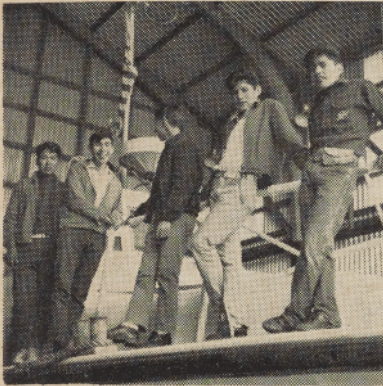


Explorers Camp Out at Coast

Mrs. Lewis A. Boyd, a former Chemawa Princess and 1935 graduate, is the first and only Indian Postmaster in Montana. Previous to her appointment with the Postal Department, she worked for the Bureau of Indian Affairs, an attorney, and served in the WACs for two years during World War II. After her service discharge, she has devoted her time to her family and a large farm in the Brockton area. Mrs. Boyd is another feather in Chemawa's bonnet.
