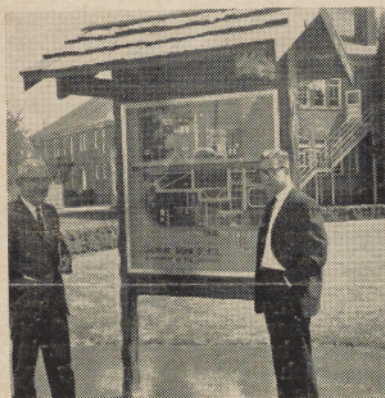


## CAMPUS MAP
