Enrollment this year at Chemawa is the highest it has been for several years. Total enrollment has reached 942 with 233 Navaho and 709 Alaskan students.

Boys outnumber girls by 112 with 527 distributed through these dormitories: Mitchell Hall 133, Brewer 217, and McNary 177. The 415 girls are housed 269 in Winona Hall and 146 in McBride.

In spite of this high enrollment many admission applications had to be rejected.

No increase in dormitory personnel was required to take care of this increased number of students. The students seem to be enjoying the chance to make additional acquaintances and form new friendships.
