Some Chemawa students are following in the educational footsteps of their fathers. Four members of the 1966 graduating class have fathers who were former students of this school.

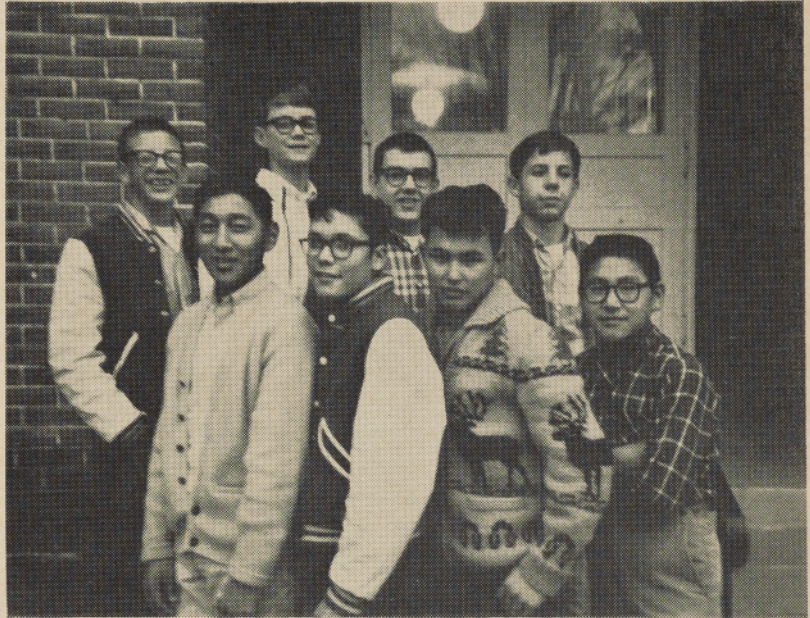
