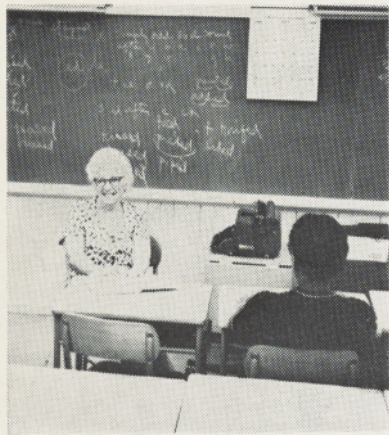


ENGLISH TEACHER RETIRES
