One of the exciting changes that has taken place on campus this year, has been the remodeling of the Academic II Building to make a new and modern study center.

Partitions were torn out between the three classrooms at the rear to make one large room. Big wooden beams were installed to support the ceiling making one large open study area with room for 100 students. Windows were equipped with new draw drapes and new tables and chairs were moved in.

The new study center also houses the library and the reference shelves. One corner of the center is equipped with a rug and upholstered furniture and is used as the magazine and newspaper reading section.

Eight hundred new library books have been placed on the shelves, bringing the total number of books to approximately 6000.

A new professional library for staff has been equipped with 186 long play disc recordings, 600 film strips, and over 300 2x2 slides.

Two recent additions to the library were a gift of 100 volumes from the Oregon State Department of Education, and a personally autographed copy of Marguerite Henry's latest horse story, "Mustang."
