Cross-country running is a real test of strength and endurance and our students have proven themselves many times, but this season has been an exceptionally good one for the team.

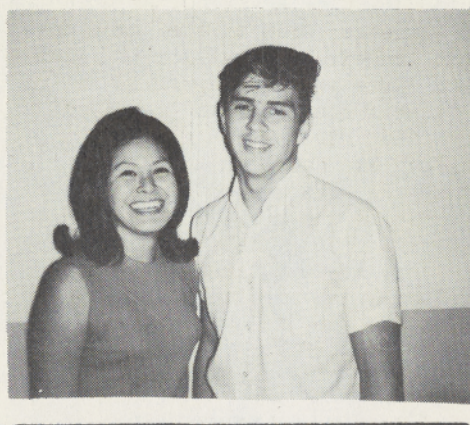
Everyone was pleased when a few invitational meets were won, but the day that they came home with the B League District Title people began to take notice.
