

FRESHMEN TAKE READING COURSE

How well can you read? All new students at Chemawa are asked that question, by way of a diagnostic reading test, which is administered early in the school year.

Freshmen students are then put into the developmental reading laboratory. Here they are grouped according to their special needs. If a student shows a limited background, he is placed in a program of basic phonics and word recognition. Others who have a stronger background are given instruction in comprehension, rate, and word skill techniques.

The two teachers who operate the instructional center, have at their disposal electrically controlled readers, individual pacer machines, group listening centers, and the latest texts and materials.

It is felt that this instruction in reading at the freshman level will enable students to do a better job in the junior and senior year.

"What a parking lot!" replied the American.

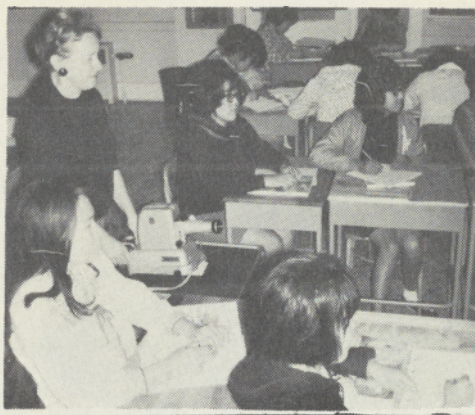
Saturday Work

The Student Employment Office at Chemawa is a very busy place. The number of students who have weekend jobs varies from 100 to 125.

They do all sorts of work; from yard work and ironing to bus boy or hotel maid.

A student gets a job by going to Mrs. Hauser, the employment officer, and telling her that they desire a job. She has them fill out a card telling what they can do and giving the information about when they want to work and who their employers have been before. The officer files the card and when an employer calls the school asking to hire someone, the cards are checked to see if someone is available. If you qualify you may get the chance to work.
