

COMPUTORS ARRIVE

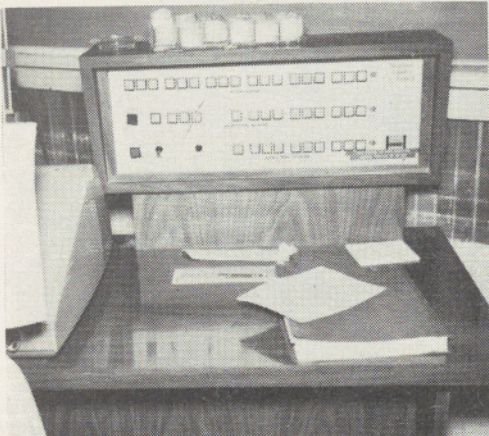
The arrival of the teletype stirred quite a bit of enthusiasm, but when the little ECP-18 computer arrived, students really went wild.

They were beginning to understand why they had devoted so much of the time last semester to the learning of computer language and why they had spent so many hours on a slide rule.

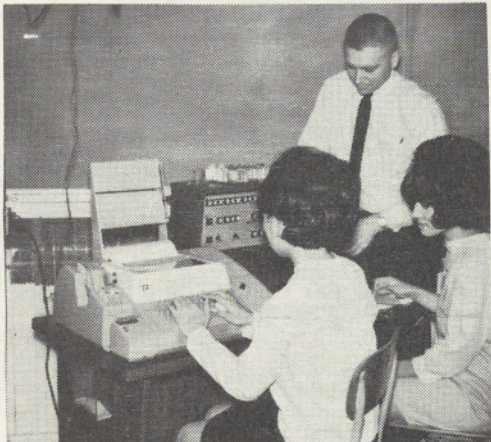
Twenty-five students are involved in working with the computer and each student has to develop his own program and run it to check for any errors.

CONSOLE OF THE ECP-18



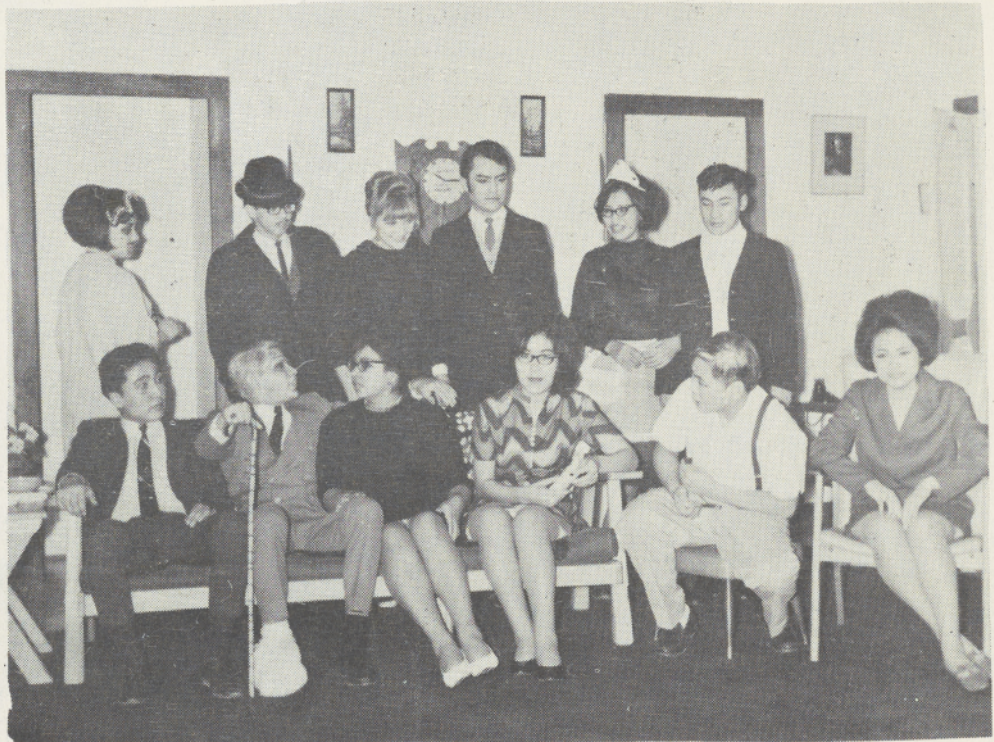
