Radiation Tried

"Scientific Experiment!!"

Last month over at the Agriculture Department our Botany teacher-Mr. Morrow-had seeds exposed to radiation for certain lengths of time. 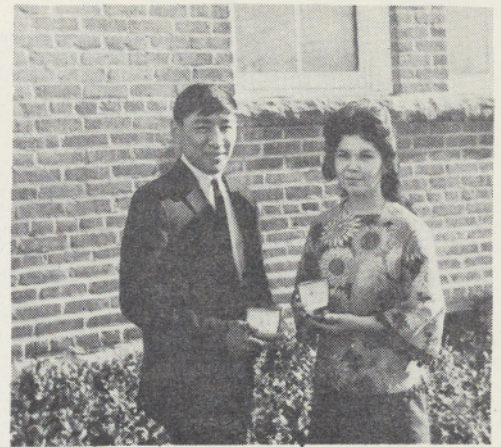
