Guides Get New Jackets

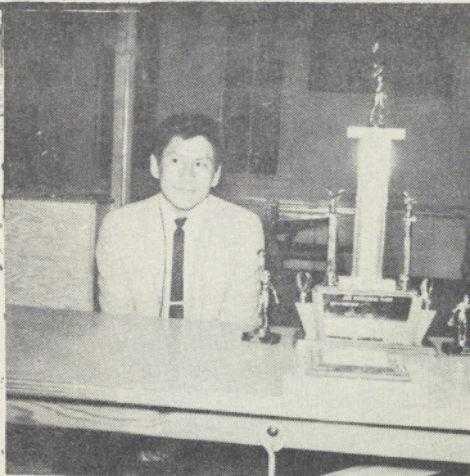
One of the busiest organizations on campus is Guides Club. It is the
