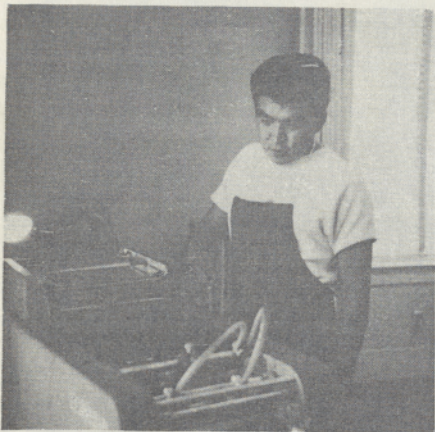
RE-ENROLL AT CHEMAWA

Although it is still necessary to type the copy twice, the Vari-

Vari-typer automatically adjusts each line of type to make the right margin to come out evenly. This automatic adjustment is accomplished by making a few adjustments on the machine before beginning to type.

The Headliner is very similar to a camera. A picture is taken of each letter on a paper film and then put through a developing process just like a film from your camera.

SCHOOL HAS SMOOTH START

Over 800 enthusiastic students have arrived for the opening of school on September 9, 1968. Additional students are arriving daily and it is expected they will continue to arrive for several weeks. Some of the late comers have been out on summer employment and were unable to leave their job for the opening day of school. Others missed their transportation schedule and had to be re-scheduled at a later date.

This year, for the first time since 1957, students are being accepted from Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. While the Northwest Students are few in number we are glad to welcome them and we are looking forward to their making a real contribution to school life.

Chemawa School is located just six miles north of Salem, Oregon, The State Capitol, and is the oldest continually operated boarding school in the Indian Service, having been established in 1881 by the military.

PAINTINGS ON DISPLAY

Chemawa is privileged to be the first boarding school to exhibit the McKenney Hall Lithographs of Famous Indian Leaders.

The exhibit consists of nearly a hundred pictures of great leaders of the past.

These pictures have been loaned to the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and will be circulated amongst other boarding schools later in the year.

The pictures are now on display in six different buildings on the Campus and have created a great deal of interest among students. A paper bound volume of biographies accompanies the pictures, and gives valuable information about the person painted.
