

FLU BUG FLEW AWAY

Students at Chemawa are rapidly recovering from a siege of the flu, which nearly reached epidemic stages the latter part of December with a total number of 310 ill. The short duration of the illness and the quick recovery was probably partially due to the fact that over 300 students had received flu shots earlier.

The highest incident of students confined to the dormitories was Dec. 26, when 208 were in bed. On the 27th, 151 were still on the sick list and by New Year's Eve only 13 were still ailing.

Students with temperatures of 100 or more were not allowed at the dining hall. Their trays were brought to them at the dorms. While confined at the dormitories the students were checked daily by the medical staff. Any student that showed indications of complications was removed to the Health Center or taken to the hospital in Salem.

At the present time, it is felt by the staff of the Health Center that while this was probably an Asian type flu virus, it has yet to be confirmed as the Hong Kong variety, and for this reason students are urged to report all illnesses promptly as there is a possibility that they might yet get the Hong Kong flu. Students that experience chest pains are especially urged to report to the clinic.

Students who have not yet taken the shots are encouraged to do so, as this immunization is available to them
