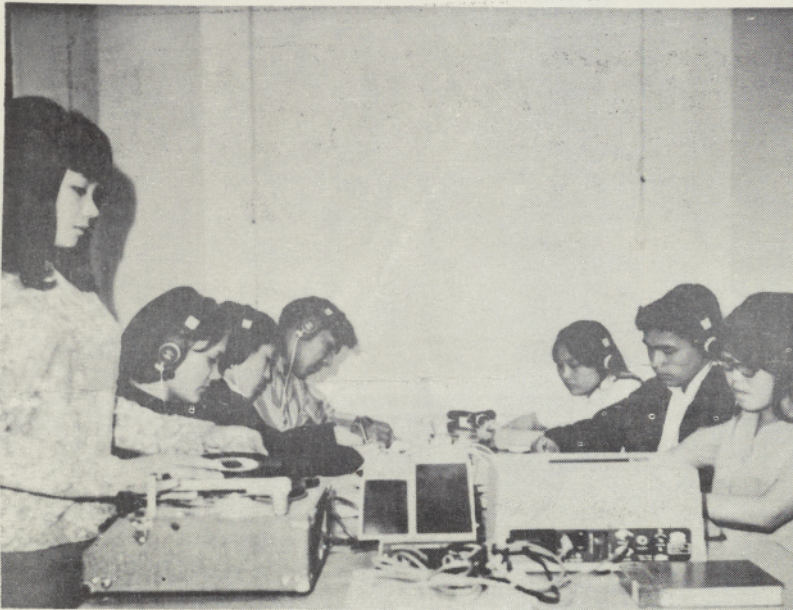

17 Try Hand at Teaching

Students think they have it tough, but one group of Chemawans are finding that 'It is not an easy task to be a teacher.'

Seventeen students are enrolled in Cadet Teaching, a course which has been offered for the first time this year. This class was offered to give college-bound students a chance to explore the field of teaching as a possible career.

The class started with an orientation period, which was taught by Mrs. Helen Matt, Supervisory Teacher, English Department.
