Twenty-two Chemawa students are studying about the most important tool man has made in the last 50 years. This very important tool is the computer. By watching movies, taking a field trip and actual 'hands on' use of a computer, they have found that it is a very simple machine that can do very hard problems, if it is programmed correctly. The class is sharing a small ECP-18 computer with several other schools in this area. The computer is made available by the Computer Instruction Network, which is federally funded. Two members of last year's computer class, Bert Greist and Frank Etcitty, have completed an additional course at Salem Technical-Vocational College in Salem. These students attended class for 3 hours every Wednesday night for ten weeks. The course gave the students a good introduction about how the computer fits into the Business World.

Before the end of the school year, the Drama class will present the four following one-act comedies for the enjoyment of the student body:

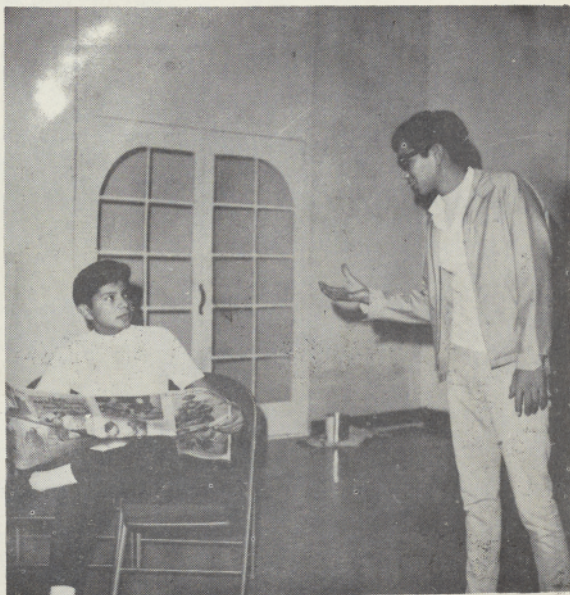
