

ALL-SCHOOL ASSEMBLY HELD

On Monday, September 29, there was an all school assembly at Chemawa that featured a musical group from San Francisco called The Wheelers.

Frank Wheeler, his wife and daughter formed the trio, which performed on Latin American instruments with the Marimba being highlighted. The most popular part of the program was a production number involving puppet-like musical clowns.
