

1970 SEASON LOOKS GOOD

On the 24th of March, the Chemawa track team began its 1970 season with a practice meet against the Gervais Cougars. The Braves of Chemawa scored 67 points to Gervais' 64 to take the meet.

The first league meet was held on April 2nd, against the Stayton Eagles. The score was Chemawa 62, Stayton 74. The meet was held on an all-weather track at Regis High School.

Despite losing the first meet, the Braves did well on April 4th, at the Willamette Relays. At the Relays, high school track teams from all over the state come to participate. At this meet Chemawa took first in the Distance Medley, 2-mile relay, and also did well in the novice events, such as the Javelin (Darryl Edenshaw) and Shotput (Arnold Edenshaw and Bill Albert).

On the 10th of April, Chemawa was host to the Woodburn Bulldogs. The Bulldogs edged the Braves 72 to 64.

So far, during this track season the times and distances are looking good. Events, such as the Javelin, thrown by Darryl Edenshaw, 2-mile, mile and 880, run by Leonard Huntington, are only a few of the better points of Chemawa's track team.

The third meet was a three-way meet, con ting of these schools: Woodburn, Sacred Heart and Chemawa. In this meet, held on April 15th, Anna Prokopiof broke her own record in the 440 yard run, with a time of 1:09.0. The scores in this meet were: Woodburn 56 1/3; Sacred Heart 33 1/3; and Chemawa held the victory, with a final score of 61 1/3!

We hope that our track girls will continue doing so well and we hope to see more of our records broken.

The fourth meet of the season will be held here at Chemawa against San-tiam High School on April 22nd.

SEARCH & RESCUE GROUP SURVIVES 4-DAY TRAINING

On March 14-17, the Explorer Post 123, Search and Rescue, left the campus at 7:45 a.m. They proceeded to a wooded area Southeast of Silver Creek Falls State Park, where they began a four-day survival exercise as part of their training for Search and Rescue team work. Four-man teams were set up to simulate a downed aircraft crew, who had to survive with minimum equipment and rations for an extended period. Each had only 1½ lbs. of food. Their rations were weighed before they left. They added more food with what they could scrounge from the land, such as rabbits, berries, and fish.
