

## A Plea For Unity

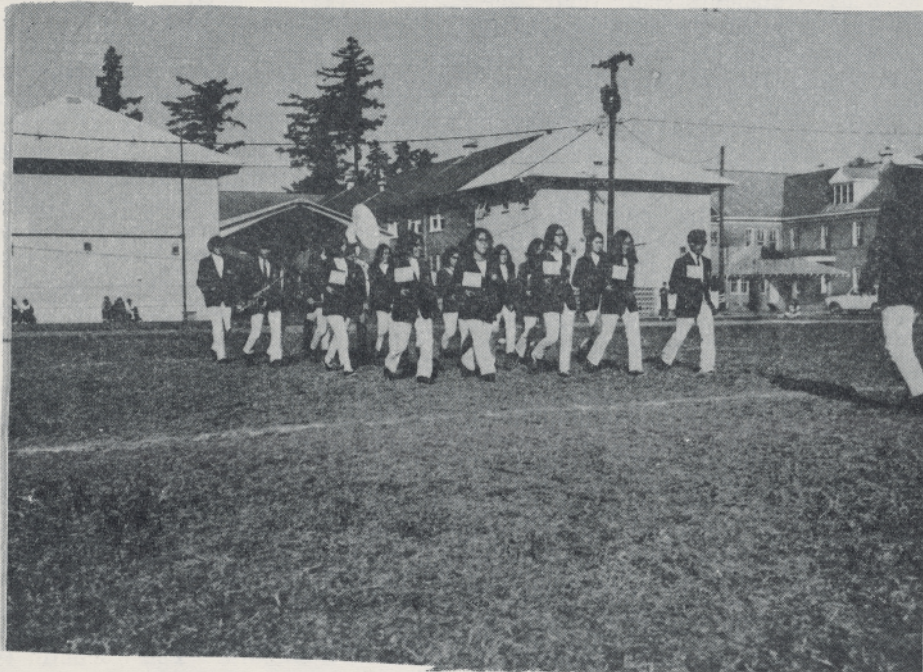

## Seniors To Get Chance To Live In Town

For the fifth year, selected groups of Chemawa Seniors will be allowed to live off campus in Salem.

The program is designed to give students an experience in city living and is based on individual maturity and need for cultural experience. The students are provided with apartments, transportation to and from school and money for incidentals.

The apartments will be used on a rotation basis, with different groups of Seniors being chosen every three weeks. The boys will have apartments at the Ambassador and Plymouth Court in Salem, while there will be two apartments for girls at Metro Manor. A total of six boys and eight girls will be able to live off campus during each three-week period. Only Seniors are eligible.
