

"Our Town" Picked For Fall Play

"Our Town", Thornton Wilder's classic play about life in a small town in the early years of the century, will be presented in late November as the all-school play for Chemawa students. The Stage Door Tremblers, the school drama club, will sponsor the show.

The major roles will be handled by Anne Williams, Miles Cleveland, Rena Martin, William Hall, Lorraine Clark, Theresa Showaway, Connie Merculief and Allen Tindore. Mr. Dashney will appear as the Stage Manager.

According to the director, Miss Graham, "Our Town" has been produced by more high schools than any other play. First performed in 1938, it was very controversial at the time because it was one of the first plays to be produced with no scenery.

The Chemawa production will take place on a blank stage with only a few simple props used to set the scene. The audience will thus be able to concentrate on the characters and what they say, rather than on artificial sets.

Art Classes This Year

There are six classes of art at Chemawa this year.

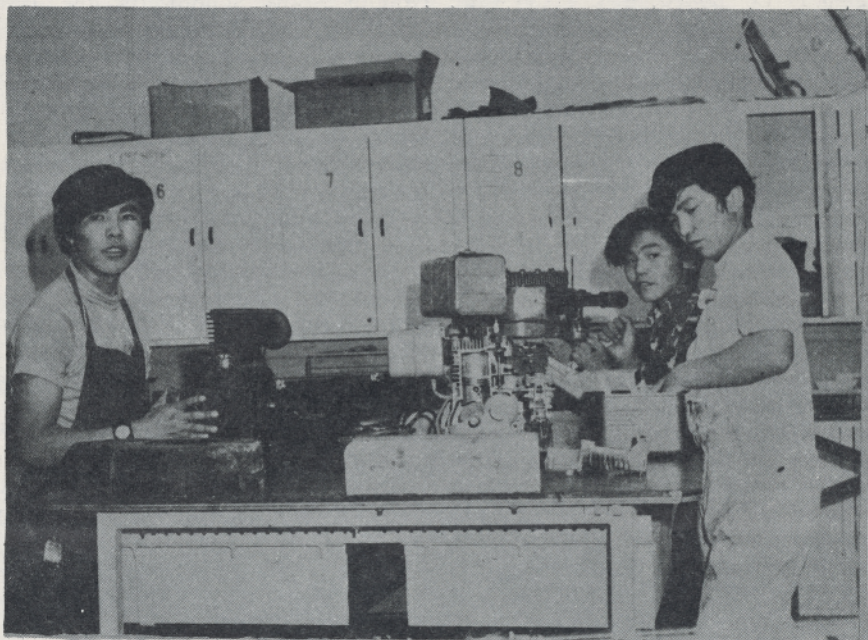
The classes, part of the Title One Project, are taught by a new teacher, Mr. Hubert Averette, and have a total enrollment of over eighty students. Most of these students are Freshmen.

In each of the classes the students may work in stichery, pottery, painting posters, wood carving or pen and ink sketching, as they choose. There is no attempt to force students to work in areas that do not interest them.

Art has been offered at Chemawa before, as a part of the recreation program, but never as a course for credit. Mr. Averette was enthusiastic about the students' response and participation. "We are trying to keep the course on a basis where the students can use their heritage as a background for their work," he said.

Go-Kart Project In Full Swing

Go-karts for the student body?!?! Could be.

A coordinated project by the mechanics classes and the school clubs is producing several machines for student use and a track on the south end of the campus is being considered.

Metal shop classes are in charge of producing the frames for the karts, and the beginning mechanics classes have the job of rebuilding and retuning engines, most of which have been taken from power mowers. These engines and other parts have been purchased with funds provided by donations by the various clubs on the campus.

The purpose behind the project is to provide karts for recreation and driver education and to provide work experience for the metals and mechanics classes. At present the classes are assembling ten frames for karts.

Chemawa Wins District Again

Chemawa is once again the district champion in cross country. The Braves won the seven-way district meet, held at Chemawa this year, with 35 points. Gervais and Woodburn tied for second with 51 each.

Tim Kochutin sloshed through 2.5 miles of mud to take third for Chemawa in a time of 13:24. Arthur Ambrose captured fourth place; Harold Huntington was seventh; Dale Simpson was ninth, and Harold Fairbanks, Terry Marchand and Joe Peters took twelfth, thirteenth and fourteenth. A total of 49 runners competed. Dan Matlock of Gervais was the individual winner.

The Chemawa Jayvees won easily, sweeping the first six places for a "perfect" score of fifteen points. Stan Johnson, Del Okboak and Don Stevens were the first three across the line. John Henry, Francis Kelly, Dave Titus and Jimmy Hunter completed the Chemawa Jayvee team.
