

Girls Win In Fall Athletics

Chemawa girls have been competing well in two sports this fall - volleyball and cross country.

Both the A and B volleyball teams are undefeated after two games. The A team is composed of Lela Tewee, Mary Melovidov, Marie Neakok, Lorean Driggs, Margaret Igkurak and Phyllis Ward. In the first game with Scio, Mary Melovidov served for nine points. The leading scorer in the second game was Margaret Igkurak with six points.

The B team is composed of Mina Bailey, Mary Looney, Rita Tangiegak,

Zoya Melovidov, Clara Stevens, Liz Taylor and Gladys Johnson.

The cross country team has competed in three meets so far this fall. Two have been dual meets with the Oregon State School for the Deaf. OSSD won the first meet 36-42. Kathy Andrews took second for Chemawa, covering the 1½ mile course in 10:29.

One week later, the Chemawa girls reversed things, winning 35-47 on the same course. Gloria Sohappay was the individual winner in 9:57 and Kathy Andrews took third in 10:09.

In their most recent meet at Gabriel Park in Portland, Chemawa finished behind the strong Willamette Valley Track Club on a two-mile course. Kathy Andrews was the individual winner in 14:22 and Gloria Sohappay took third in 14:33. Other members of the team competing were Matilda Dayton, JoAnn Malemute, Maggie Oktollik, Gloria Gregory, Peggy Moses and Lorraine Snyder. Polly Long is the manager.

C. C. Runners Take It All

The Chemawa cross country team wound up its regular season with a perfect league record of six wins and no losses. In addition to the dual meet wins, the team picked up trophies at three invitational meets at North Marion, Philomath and Western Menonite, and hosted the 4th annual Chemawa Invitational meet as well.

"This is the hardest working and most improved team I have ever coached," said Coach Louis. "They have come along much further than I expected."

Pacing the Chemawa runners this year were Sophomore Arthur Ambrose, who ran the 2½-mile home course in 13:07, and Freshman Tim Kochutin, who covered the same distance in 13:13, a new Freshman record. Another Freshman, Dale Simpson, with a best time of 13:21, also held the frosh record briefly before Kochutin broke it.

Other members of the Varsity team include Terry Marchand, with a best time of 13:26; Harold Huntington, 13:22; Harold Fairbanks, 13:41; and Don Stevens, 14:09. All marks are for the home course only.

The Jayvee squad, composed of Joe Peters, Dave Titus, John Henry, Stan Johnson, Francis Kelley, Jim Hunter and Del Okback, also did a fine job for the school this year.

The six straight wins make Chemawa the odds-on favorite in league and district competition and give the Braves a chance to finish high in state competition. With a fine Junior Varsity and a Varsity dominated by Freshmen and Sophomores, the prospects for even more wins in the future are very bright.

Chemawa Scores Against Five

The Braves scored two touchdowns in each of their last five games, but they weren't enough, and Chemawa goes against North Marion, still looking for its first win.

Shut out except for a single safety in their first two games, the Braves found the scoring range for sixteen points against St. Paul and Stayton and added fourteen each against Gervais, Gladstone and Woodburn. Mistakes and penalties killed chances for several other scores.

The Braves' offense is lead by the inside running of Mike Williams, who has gained one hundred yards or more in several games. Abraham George and Cisco Albert give Chemawa one of the best passing attacks in the league. Their favorite targets are Roland Mason and Darrell Abrahamson. Jerry Barger has also drawn praise from Coach Lawver for his fine line work on both offense and defense. The Braves will finish their schedule against North Marion and Cascade.
