The wrestlers also have a new 30 by 30 foot mat, which is one of the largest in the district. With the new mat, the Braves hope to schedule many more home matches next season.

At the district meet Alvin Charley finished in fourth place in the 178-pound division, and Roland Andrew scored another pin to run his total for the season to twelve pins in fifteen matches.

Girls Compete In Tournament

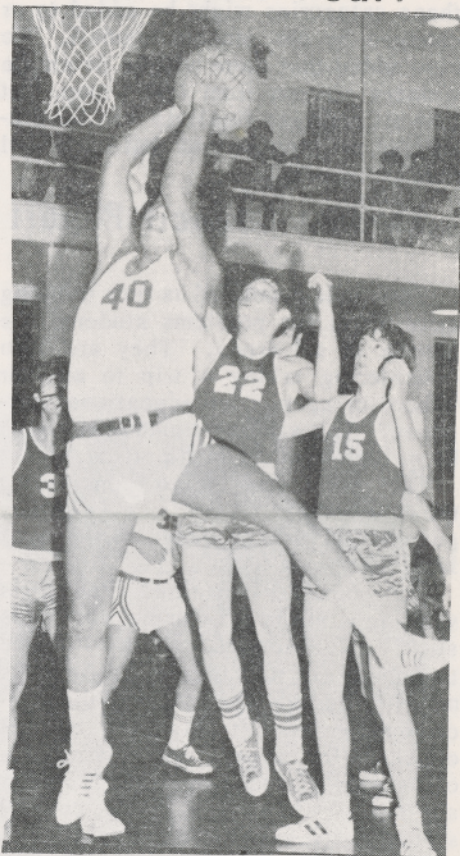
The girls varsity basketball team participated in the Yakima All-Indian Tournament at Toppenish, Washington on March 20-21.
