Waitresses Raid Dorms

On the same date as Pearl Harbor, the waitresses raided Winona Hall and McBride Hall for the "recouperation" of missing cups, knives, spoons, and sugar bowls.

The Dining Hall started out with 860 cups. They have replaced 420 cups. They now have 480, and they are now missing 800 cups (all together). Other items are in short supply. The Dining Hall is short 587 tumblers, 940 spoons, 691 forks, 705 knives, 21 coffee pitchers, and 226 sugar shakers.

Mr. Douglas says "If we continue to go at this pace for the next quarter, then the students and staff had better start working on chop sticks and saving paper cups."

The Dining Hall staff asks every student and adult to lend a helping hand in seeing the kitchen equipment gets back to the proper place.
