## Rifle Team Formed Native Poet Speaks

Starting January 19th, the first Rifle Club for Chemawa Indian School, was formed.

The school's Recreation Dept, is working with the club, which is sponsored by the Optomist Club from downtown Salem, through cooperation with the Oregon National Guard.

Boys from Brewer and McNary Halls will participate and compete against four other teams from the Salem area for marksmanship. There will be two teams of ten boys. The boys of each team will be competing against each other and five will be chosen to represent their teams.

The Rifle Club will have the use of the Indoor Rifle Range at the Salem Armory.

After three years, this Rifle Club is finally becoming a reality, and is one of the few projects which Chemawa will be able to compete within the Salem community. Next year the Rifle Club hopes to compete in Northwest Rifle Association meets.

Mr. LeRoy Selam, a member of the Yakima Tribe, spoke to several of the English classes on January 12. He spoke on several things pertaining to the Indian of today and the Indian of yesterday.

Mr. Selam is an author, lecturer, poet and Indian singer. He knows his own language and the old ways of his tribe. He also attended Chemawa during the 1940's.

Mr. Selam talked about one poem that he wrote. The poem was published last year in "The Indian Historian". The name of the poem is "What Is This Upon My Land?" This poem is based upon "what is happening to the Indians today".

Mr. Selam also showed other books written by other Indian authors and poets. He said he felt it was his duty to talk to Indian people and help keep Indian students in school. He said that he hoped to come back and sing with the N.I.C.E. Club.
