

## Brewer Hall Tries New Living System

Brewer Hall is trying a new system called the "Group Living Behavior Modification Project." Mr. Ted Young, Brewer's Dorm Counselor, started the program last year. This year he has made improvements after a full examination of last year's results.

Under the new system Brewer Hall is divided into five living units, each of them a team. Each team has a manager and two student captains, one appointed by the manager and one elected by the team members.

Each team member is awarded points daily for doing specific tasks, such as room care and work details. The points earned by the team are added and then converted into a percentage efficiency score for the week.

Two awards are given weekly, one to the team with the highest work detail efficiency and one to the team with the highest room-care efficiency. The awards (\$12.50 each from the Title III program) are used for a group activity chosen by the team members.

The purpose of the project, according to Mr. Young, is to help individual students of Brewer Hall live a more responsible dorm life.

The Drama Club haven't decided on what play they should work on but they have three plays in mind.

The club has had quite a few girls and only two boys for tryouts. If more boys don't come to tryouts, they will have to do a play that has mostly girls parts. The play will go into rehearsal very soon.

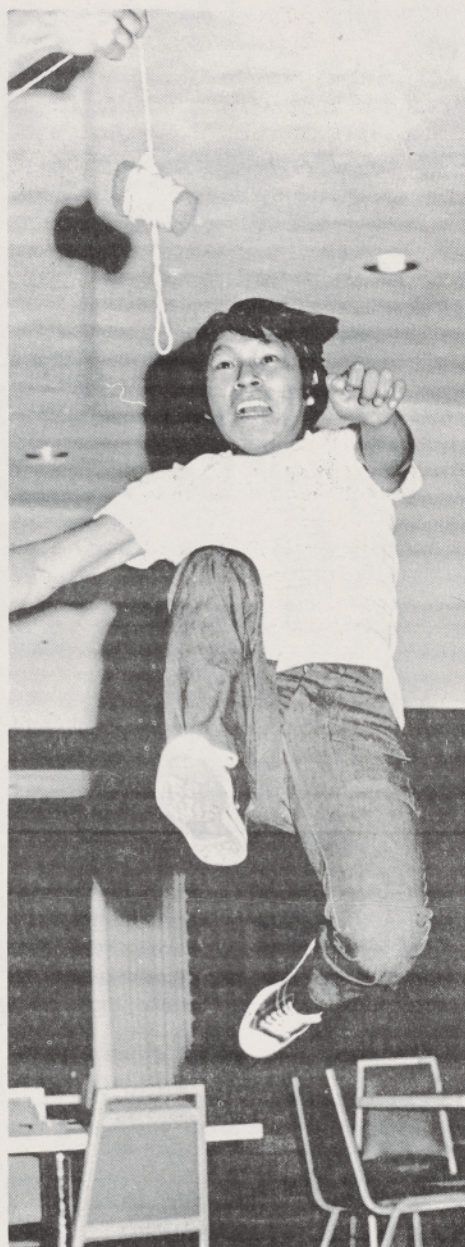
Miss Graham would like any boy interested in acting in a play to come for the tryouts at Academic One, Room 4.
