Mr. Kent is a new special counselor, and is the only man in the dorm. He is there to give advice, to talk with and to help the girls with their education.

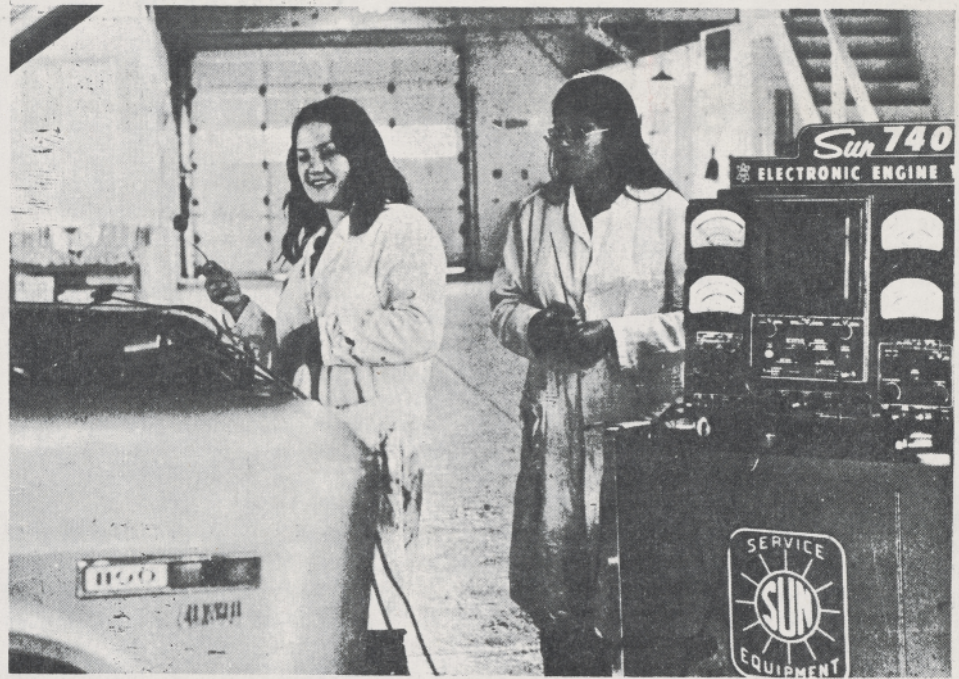
Bankers Hold Election

Women's liberation is really progressing at Chemawa. There are two girls enrolled in the auto mechanics class this year.

For years girls have been trying to take auto mechanics, but it was always for boys only. Finally two females have made it in.

And just who are these two girl mechanics? They are Lorena Thompson and Ernestine ("Ernie") Wheeler both seniors this year.

In auto mechanics the students work on the cars, trucks and vans owned by the government and used by the school. Staff members who bring their own cars into the shop to be worked on have to pay for parts and labor.

When the auto mechanics teacher, Mr. H. C. Cox, was asked how he felt about having girls in his class, he said, "I feel it's a good experience for any girl, particularly those who are mechanically inclined. The automotive world has many fields that girls can qualify for. Not only as mechanics, but as automotive secretaries, service sales persons, parts counter saleswomen and writers on editorials, trade journals and warranty work."

a good experience to know a little about auto mechanics, and as it's going now, it gets more and more interesting."
