New School Coming Closer

"We have just concluded a review of the architect's proposal—the conceptual phase of the design for Chemawa's new campus. The reception was generally very favorable."

The speaker was Allen Cornwall from Facilities-Engineering, BIA Central Office in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He was one of the

reviewers who met with the architects, Payne, Settecase & Smith, here May 1 to review designs for the new Chemawa.

The panel included other representatives from Albuquerque, the Portland Area Office, U. S. Public Health Service, Chemawa Advisory School Board, School Administration and Student Council.

"We are very pleased with the progress to date," said Darwin Doss of Payne, Settecase & Smith. "We are excited over the school and want to get going into the design development phase."

This stage, which he anticipates taking another two months, will include a lengthy cost analysis of materials and construction. "We are about three to four months from starting working drawings, the ones that can be handed to a contractor to build with," Doss said.

In its technical details the new campus will resemble some of Payne, Settecase & Smith's other work, particularly at Willamette University. But from a design basis the school will have a unique character all its own—"As it should," Doss commented.

Merculief Completes First Solo

Richard Merculief became the first Chemawa aviation student to solo May 1 when he took a Cessna 150 trainer up by himself for 36 minutes at Salem Municipal Airport.

Richard is now more than half way to getting his private pilot's license, according to Chemawa Aviation Teacher Ellis Moncrief. Rich is now cleared to solo around a practice area traffic pattern. The next step will be cross-country experience.

"Right at the beginning, before I got in the plane, I was nervous," Merculief said. "But after I took off, everything went okay."

"Richard is a natural flyer," said Instructor Rob Pike of Salem Aviation.

After graduation Richard plans to attend Anchorage Community College to study Air Frame Power Plant. He hopes to become a qualified aircraft mechanic as well as a pilot and eventually own his own charter in Alaska. Currently five graduates of Chemawa's aviation program are studying for their aircraft mechanic's licenses.

"I observed his takeoffs and landings, and they were good," Moncrief said. "He didn't bounce at all."
