Man on the Run

I was talking with Mr. Earl Douglas whom you are probably acquainted with as the Big Cheese of our Chow Hall. He was telling me about his financial problems and the rising cost of the food which is required to keep the students here at Chemawa well-fed.

Like for instance--an 18-slice slab of bacon sold for 70¢ a pound in May. In October the price will go up to 9¢. Grill beef in May was \$2.35 a pound. In October it will be \$4.00. But you haven't seen your six-ounce ration of meat cut in half as the price has doubled, have you?

Fruit and vegetables have nearly doubled price-wise. Sugar now is \$34.95 for a hundred pounds. And Mr. Douglas says that he uses about 150 pounds of sugar a day. He predicts it will get a lot higher, for he is aware of the 3.5 billion acres of sugar cane destroyed in Georgia, Louisiana and Alabama by Hurricane Clara.

In one year the cost of food has risen 18.7%.

It would undoubtedly tickle some employees over at the Chow Hall if everyone was to eat all that he or she takes. Some students don't realize that the cereal they don't eat takes about 45 days to get here from the time the order is made. It's 30 days for most food, except for potatoes, which Mr. Douglas on the market downtown.

To him this is like shopping for a family like homemakers shop for families--but Douglas' family has 385 members. Douglas will have been here 12 years this February.

92% of the students eat all their meals at the Chow Hall. A few miss breakfast and lunch.
