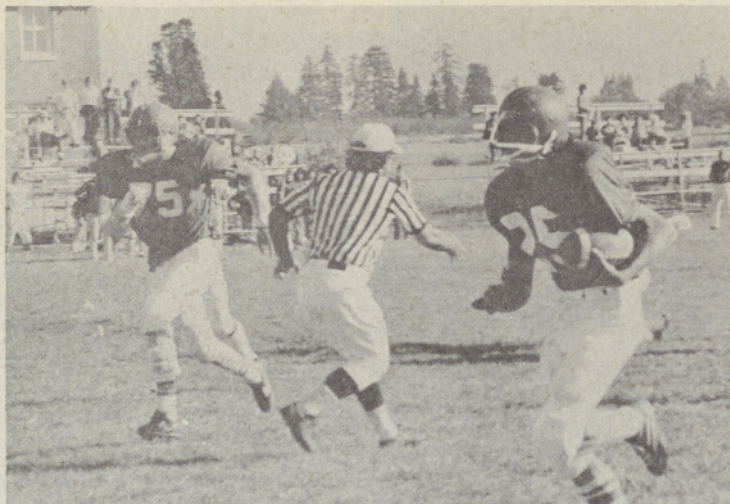


Chemawa Travels To Scio For Game Tonight
