by knockout - and only 5 defeats. Levering is a graduate of Haskell Indian Junior College and an OMAHA/BANNOCK.

The youngest of the inductees is twenty-six year old DAVID W. BRAY of Gowanda, New York. Bray, a graduate of Cornell University, starred in lacrosse, track and basketball. He was an honorable mention All-American in 1977, an all-star in the North American Lacrosse Association, a participant in the 1977 north-south all-star lacrosse contest and was given the American Indian Athletic Award that year. A versatile athlete, Bray was also most valuable player in a SENECA National basketball tournament in 1976.

The final honoree is GEORGE P. LAVATTA, of Portland, Oregon. LaVatta served as the first chairman of the Hall of Fame Trustees from 1972 to 1976. LaVatta is a graduate of the famous Carlisle Indian School, and began work with the Bureau of Indian Affairs in 1929. Now retired, LaVatta received the Distinguished Service Citation from the Department of Interior. He was honored for improving and promoting understanding "between the Indian people and the general public," and for bringing about "a dramatic change in the attitude toward employment of Indians." LaVatta was also named Man of the Year by the Portland Chamber of Commerce. LaVatta is a member of the SHOSHONE-BANNOCK tribe.

The American Indian Athletic Hall of Fame was founded in 1972 to honor Indians who have distinguished themselves in all areas of athletics. The first enshrinement ceremony was held that year. To date, 44 athletes have been honored. Any Indian athlete may be nominated. The final selection is made by the Hall of Fame Trustees.

Master of Ceremonies for the 1981 Hall of Fame Banquet will be DR. JAMES LYNN LEE, Outstanding Haskell Alumnus of 1980. Lee is a CHEROKEE Indian from Chehalis, Washington.

AWARDS ANNOUNCED FOR 1981 RED CLOUD INDIAN ART SHOW

Pine Ridge, South Dakota -- Awards totalling \$2,750 have been provided by patrons of the 13th annual Red Cloud Indian Art Show, to be held here June 7 through August 9, 1981.

One of the few art shows restricted to entries by American Indian, Eskimo and Aleut artists, it has now grown to be the nation's largest showing of painting drawings and sculptures by artists of more than thirty different tribes.

"Our purpose is to increase public awareness of the great artistic talents that exist among the true native peoples of America, and to provide a marketplace for their work," Brother C.M. Simon, S.J., director of the show said.

Some years, he said, as much as sixty percent of the art displayed is sold to visitors who come from many parts of the nation, as well as several foreign countries.

There are no entry fees, and Red Cloud Indian School, which sponsors the show, charges no commission on sales. All monies go to the artists.

No admission fee is charged.

Artists wishing to enter the show should write to Red Cloud Indian School, Pine Ridge, SD 57770 for entry forms.
