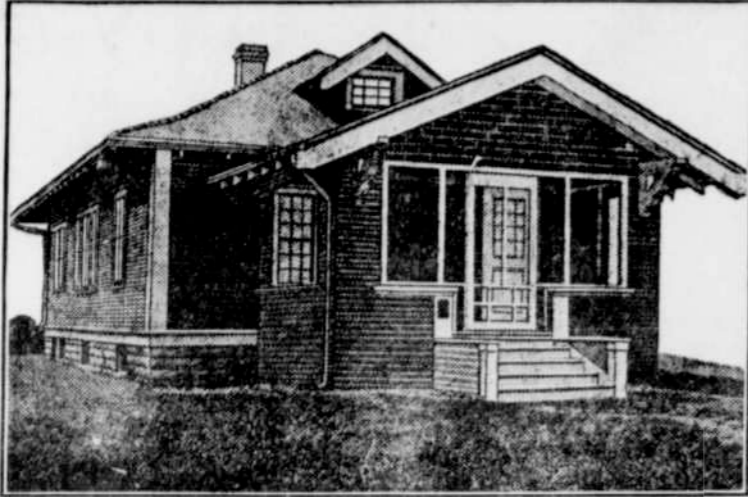


A POPULAR SMALL BUNGALOW HOME.

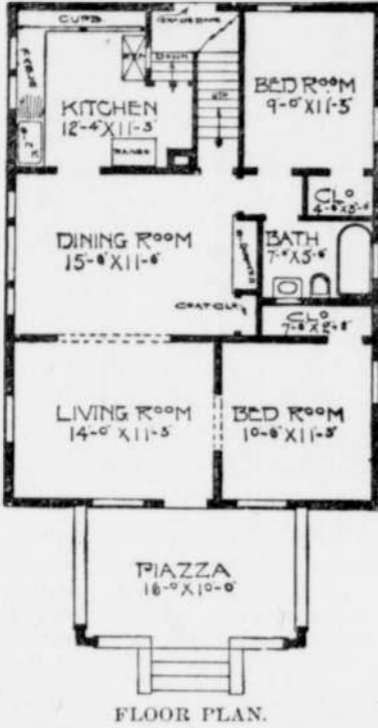

This plan has been built many times and has given perfect satisfaction to all of its owners. It makes a complete home all on one floor. There is a large living room, two bedrooms with a bath in between and good closet space. The dining room is large and contains a built-in sideboard at the end of the room. The kitchen is complete in every respect, has built-in cupboard, table with drawers underneath, sink and drain board all connected; also has a combination stairway. Attic has abundance of space for a small bedroom. The house is planned to be finished in birch, red oak or Washington fir throughout, the first story with birch or maple floors. There is a full basement. First story is nine feet high; size twenty-six feet wide and thirty-six feet deep. Cost to build, exclusive of heating and plumbing, \$1,850.

This is one of my most practical and complete colonial homes, well adapted to a good sized family, either for a city or suburban or country home, as it is supplied with almost unlimited number of chambers. The size of the house is thirty-six feet wide and thirty-four feet deep, containing in the first story four exceptionally nice rooms, besides a very large hall. The front part of the house is all open together by columned archway, thus giving the appearance of a very spacious residence. In the second story there are five well arranged and good sized chambers, all of which have splendid closet space. There are two separate stairways leading to the second story, one from the rear entry and the beautiful open stairway leading from the hall from the center of the house. In the third story four good chambers can be finished if desired, thus giving the house a capacity of nine sleeping rooms. The first story is finished in birch or red oak throughout. The second story is finished in pine enameled any color that owner desires, with birch doors or pine doors stained and varnished to represent mahogany, carrying out the old New England colonial idea of treatment. There is a full basement under the house. The floor of the piazza is made of re-enforced concrete. The first story is nine feet, second story is eight feet in the clear when finished. Cost to build, exclusive of heating and plumbing, \$5,200.

Federation Per Capita Tax.
The Atlanta convention of the American Federation of Labor raised the per capita tax of national and international unions from a half cent to two-thirds of a cent per member per month. The executive council in its report recommended the increase. The matter was referred to the laws committee, and that committee brought in a favorable report. An increase in the per capita tax had become necessary in order to extend the activities of the federation. The recommendation of the committee was carried.

Bonus For Mill Workers.
The Bourne Cotton Mills corporation of Fall River, Mass., recently paid to its operatives the forty-fourth semi-annual profit-sharing dividend, amounting to 2 per cent on wages paid to regular operatives from June 5 to Dec. 7. The amount paid out was about \$4,000. Seven hundred operatives are employed.
